This funding (\$448,675 over 5 years) is to bring evidence-based programs into communities that raise awareness and skills around mental health. The Prevention Services Team at the Tooele County Health Dept. submitted a proposal for this funding in hopes to augment its suicide prevention trainings and increase capacity to address suicide in the community. The funded proposal includes the following major objectives:

1. Fund a part-time Prevention Specialist position dedicated to coordinating and offering mental health & suicide prevention training.
2. Augmentation of Mental Health and Suicide Prevention courses being offered in Tooele County. Increase accessibility of courses and frequency.
 - a. Mental Health First Aid: Provide specialized Mental Health First Aid courses to Law Enforcement and First Responders
 - b. Question Persuade Refer (QPR) - Gatekeeper Training
 - c. VitalCog - Suicide prevention in the workplace
3. Annual sub-contract with Valley Behavioral Health to support Crisis Intervention Training (from CIT-Utah & CIT-Internat'l) offered to Law Enforcement & First Responders
